

Case Examples

RACHEL

16 year old resident referred byTruro PD following a response to the home due to conflicts between her and her parents. Met with Rachel and her mother at the home and explored past utilization of behavioral health services. Discussed what has worked well for the teen and family and assisted them in connecting with a new therapist who could provide in person sessions closer to home. Explored adjunct behavioral health supports such as art classes to further support prosocial development.

KEITH

73 year old resident referred to navigator by his PCP, mentioned at an appointment that his truck had broken down and he did not have the money for the repair. Resident lives alone, family in the Boston area. Met with the resident to discuss sources of financial support including Lower Cape Outreach Council and Dexter Keezer Fund. Through the course of home visits, explored more pressing need of a repair in the bathroom. Resident was able to obtain a quote from a local plumber and navigator assisted in accessing financial assistance to cover the entire cost. Remain in contact with resident.



COGNITIVE
BEHAVIORAL
THERAPY

Focus on thoughts, feelings and behaviors that drive mental health conditions



PSYCHOEDUCATION

Providing residents with accurate information regarding their mental health symptoms and ways to address these concerns



MOTIVATIONAL INTERVIEWING

Helping residents make positive behavioral changes utilizing the stages of change

Case Examples

HENRY

80 y.o male. Experiencing ongoing grief and caregiver burnout after the death of his partner. Provide weekly grief -focused counselling in home. Utilized CBT and motivational interviewing.

KAYLA

24 y.o. female. Referral from community navigator. Resident had agoraphobia, so she was unable to access office visits. Provided in home therapy to support with anxiety and substance misuse. Collaborated with treatment team to ensure continuity of care. Increased and decreased frequency of support based on the resident's needs.

CLINICAL ASSESSMENT

Nursing assessment addressing symptoms, medications, diagnosis, care team, support system, needs and strengths



TEACHING

Providing residents with accurate information concerning safety planning, disease management and progression



Communication with PCP, specialists, families, town departments

Case Examples

MARTIN

89 year old male preparing for an upcoming surgery and family had concerns regarding caregiving for his wife who was dependent on him for daily living. The family contacted COA and outreach worker referred town nurse to assess and discuss possible options for pre and post surgery. A few home visits and phone calls gave him more understanding of what is available for assists and outcomes. He will be followed up leading up to planned surgery and communication with family and care team will continue

MARGE

86 year old female living alone, with multiple health issues. She recently self determined discharge from assisted living facility after lengthy stay at hospital and rehab. She was living at assisted living community for 2 months as she was deemed unsafe to return home. Upon arriving home she called rescue for lift and assist and as well as rescue transports to er and medical appointments with in weeks of returning home. A co -visit with COA outreach worker led to a discussion of safety and need for additional assistance. Visits included teachings of safety and disease management. Facilitated a televisit visit with PCP and arrange for homecare services to include physical therapy. She increased her endurance and home safety measures and is able to leave her home with walker. A follow up visit with outreach worker and town nurse reinforced benefit of partnerships in community and relationship building with residents.

Health & Wellness Fairs

Attendance at local health and wellness fairs to promote supportive services available to residents



For the 4th summer in a row, partnering with Sustainable Cape to provide free weekly produce to residents from the farmer's market. Advocated for inclusion of this program as a Mass Health insurance benefit.





Critical Incident Management
System and Support Team

Integration into public safety's reporting platform to streamline referrals for those with substance use and mental health concerns. Additional trainings attended to provide clinical support to public safety as a part of the Critical Incident Support Team


19 S. Highland Road, Truro, MA RE: request for a nitrogen credit/Install of a Fast septic system


To the Truro Health Department,

We are Requesting a permit for the nitrogen credit for the new ADU (to allow for the use of the new ADU above the garage.) - third bedroom in the two-bedroom zoning. The property already had a three-bedroom approved septic but needed to be changed to comply with current regulations.

We purchased the property for rental use. (It was already a summer rental property). We have already rented the primary 2 BR house to a year-round full-time local workforce individual. Our goal is to rent out the new one-bedroom ADU as a second year-round local workforce housing unit on the property.

We have been working with Arizona Davis and Emily Beebe in the health department and also with the Building Department since we purchased the property last summer to get this property ready to house local full-time outer cape residents - a much-needed resource.

Subject: Request for connection to Provincetown Water System for development of the Walsh

property

On behalf of the Town of Truro, the Select Board respectfully requests an extension of the existing water main service from the Truro Central School located at 317 Route 6, 400 feet south to Walsh Way.

The water main would provide service to the Walsh property, in that area closest to Route 6. The service would support proposed residential development, ultimately, not to exceed 160 units, as recommended to the Town at the 2024 Special Town Meeting. A phased development process is proposed, with a first phase of 60 to 80 units, and this phase is not to exceed 9,900 gpd (90 bedrooms) of Title 5 flow. The first phase may be constructed in stages, based on water and wastewater resources.

The town recognizes that currently there is limited water capacity and water pressure. Truro is committed to working with Provincetown on the shared priorities of constructing a water tower and developing an additional wellsite in Truro to support the combined growth management forecasts of both Truro and Provincetown. As efficiency is necessary to mitigate our Outer Cape regional housing crisis, the town anticipates working on these priorities on parallel tracks as development plans continue for the Walsh property, ensuring that housing comes online as soon as water resources are available. Our request serves to initiate the first phase of the Walsh property development plan simultaneously with the installation of the water tower and initiate future phases simultaneously with the development of an additional wellsite.

The partnership between Provincetown and Truro is essential to addressing our shared and individual town needs and goals. We are developing the engineering plans to provide the Town of Provincetown with more detailed documentation to support this request and we wish to include the Walsh property development needs in the immediate- to near-term growth forecast. We look forward to discussing this request with you and to working together to address our regional housing crisis and our shared water resources needs.
